NCPD's Giftedness Gala and Silent Auction was held Thursday, April 16, 2009 to honor pioneers Dr. David Byers and Dolores Wilson, and fundraiser/advocate Brian D. Stevens. We thank so many of you for joining us to honor these extraordinary individuals and their work for and with people with disabilities. Over 200 people were in attendance .



Dr. Byers was one of the original members of the Bishops' Committee on Disability, a contributor to the [1978 Pastoral Statement of U.S. Catholic Bishops on People with Disabilities](#). Dr. Byers served as executive director of the Committee on the Home Missions, the Committee on

Evangelization and the Committee on Science and Human Values during his 30-year tenure with the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. He also served as a founding Board Member of NCPD from 1982 to 1994.

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Brian D. Stevens is a business executive, member of the Knights of Malta, an ex-officio NCPD Board member and



founder of the Catholic Disabilities Foundation (CDF). Brian has also received the "Compassion Award" from Cardinal Roger Mahoney of Los Angeles for his dedication and service on behalf of homeless people. In applying his CEO expertise to these humanitarian causes, Brian has provided invaluable assistance to the development and growth of NCPD.

Dolores Wilson previously was the Director of Disability Ministry for the Archdiocese of Washington, DC. She was a founding member of The Lt. Joseph P. Kennedy Institute where she served and learned from the children there for 25 years. Dolores is the founder and director of "Bethlehem House" in Washington, DC which is a family setting where people with intellectual and developmental disabilities are welcomed and loved. She is also the Eastern Provincial Coordinator of Faith and Light in the United States.

Holy Cards Available for Servant of God, Dr. Jerome Lejeune

Dr. Jerome Lejeune has been named "Servant of God," and his cause for sainthood is now being postulated by the Abbey of Saint Wandrille in France.



Pray for Us

Dr. Lejeune (Montroque, France, June 26, 1926-April 3, 1994) was a French Catholic pro-life pediatrician and geneticist best known for his discovery of the link of diseases to chromosome abnormalities. He made his career specializing in the treatment of children with Down Syndrome before he attended a Copenhagen meeting of scientists where the discovery of the number of human chromosomes was discussed. Afterwards, it occurred to him to check the number of chromosomes in his Down Syndrome patients. After taking a skin biopsy from one of his patients, Dr. Lejeune, using borrowed equipment, discovered that children with Down Syndrome have an extra copy (called a trisomy) of chromosome 21. He spent the remainder of his life researching a cure for Down Syndrome.

The holy physician was a friend of Pope John Paul II. When His Holiness created the Pontifical Academy for Life, he appointed Dr. Lejeune its first president, just prior to the good doctor's death from cancer in Paris in 1994.


Catechetical Sunday, September 20, 2009

The format of our podcast is simple. Each podcast has four segments:

The first segment: One Flock, One Shepherd, (*John 10:16*) - will be a discussion that will highlight sections of the 1978 Pastoral Statement of the United States Catholic Bishops on Person with Disabilities.

The second segment, "Be Opened" (*Mark 7:34*) - will emphasize ways we can meet contemporary challenges in disability ministry.

The third segment, Your Light Must Shine (*Matthew 5:16*) - will put the spotlight on various local and national agencies and organizations, who respond to the needs

of persons with disabilities.



The fourth segment, Many Gifts but the Same Spirit (*1 Cor. 12:4*) - will present a reflection about Spirituality and Disability. Sometimes the reflections would speak to where we find God in our lives as we live with a disability and sometimes they will speak to persons who minister to the disability community.

We hope our podcast will offer you encouragement and that you will join us every month as we explore ways that all of us can better respond to the Church's mission of making God's loving presence known in the world, acknowledging the barriers we face, while striving to remove them.

Legislation and Advocacy

Community Choice Act Support by NCPD

NCPD, legislators and thousands of disability and social justice leaders have a long history of supporting the passage of this housing & disability services initiative (S. 683/H.R. 1670). We

once again have joined with other religious and religiously-affiliated organizations to write to Congress in strong support of the Community Choice Act to support this legislation which promotes independence with dignity and allows individuals who receive long-term services through Medicaid to have a choice in where, how and from whom they receive personal assistance. Encourage your legislators to support the Community Choice Act. These services, currently available to some under the Medicaid Waiver (the Katie Beckett Waiver), are of great benefit to those children and adults who receive them, and their families.

Possible Funding Sources for Catholic Schools and Parishes

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 was recently signed into law. Funds are being distributed by federal agencies to states and communities throughout the country to build, repair and upgrade a wide range of facilities, systems and programs. The Department of Justice is taking this opportunity to remind state and local government officials, business owners and building professionals of their obligations under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).
