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In Memoriam of Eunice Kennedy Shriver

Editor's note: With this morning's sad news of the death of Eunice Kennedy Shriver, a great Catholic woman and friend of people with disabilities, we are able to share the following thoughts. NCPD joins with so many others to express our gratitude to God for the life of this extraordinary woman. Our prayers and condolences to Eunice Shriver's husband, Sargent Shriver, her five children and their spouses, and nineteen grandchildren.

A letter was sent this morning to people involved with the Special Olympics by the organization's Chairman and CEO, Timothy P. Shriver, with permission to share its contents with others to help communicate the news of his mother's death early this morning, August 11, 2009, at the age of 88.

Though at the end her body had become weak, her heart was strong and it was abundantly full. It was overflowing with faith in God's will. It was replete with a sense of contentment about the past and a deep hope for the future. It was full of love and gratitude for those to whom she had dedicated her life's work and who had in return given her life the gifts of clarity, aspiration and friendship.

Her heart was full indeed of faith, hope and love. She was very much at peace.

She believed that people with intellectual disabilities could - individually and collectively - achieve more than anyone thought possible. This much she knew with unbridled faith and certainty. And this faith in turn gave her hope that their future might be radically different.

Mrs. Shriver's advocacy and work for people with disabilities extended far past the Special Olympics. As her daughter, Maria Shriver Schwarzenegger, well known journalist and

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First Lady of California has said, "her mother's fingerprints could be found" all over every major piece of legislation, forward movement and advocacy in behalf of establishing rights and room for people with disabilities since the 1960's. The Rose Kennedy Curriculum that supports inclusion in religious education programming of parishioners with intellectual disabilities, and now in modified form for others such as those with Autism, is but one of those elements that we are so familiar with and use. Teresa of Calcutta in a famous quote said "Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth, but yours." Eunice Shriver can be said to have brought the presence of Christ to others through her good works and service.

Mental Illness Awareness Workshops: *Increasing Support and Hope in Catholic Parish Communities*

In July over 150 people participated in three one-day workshops held in Washington, DC; Chicago, IL; and Portland, OR, created and sponsored by the NCPD Council on Mental Illness. They were conducted as test sites in different geographical settings with three different site-teams to assess the carefully prepared workshop materials and video, *Welcomed and Valued*, in anticipation of preparing leaders through an in-depth three-day training to present the one-day awareness workshop across the United States. Future e-news will report on opportunities for you to attend this workshop.

In addition to participants and team members responding with evaluations, each site was attended by Janice Benton, Executive Director of NCPD, and two other professional evaluators who were observing and evaluating from the specific perspective of their professional group, i.e. youth ministry, catechetics, pastoral ministry, and others. Better than 90% of participants completed their evaluations at the end of the day.

We were thrilled with the enthusiastic response of participants. Some comments from the evaluations follow.

The 27 minute DVD; *Welcomed and Valued* premiered as part of the workshop series:

- Excellent video. Consider advertising it and offering it to all parishes.

Legislation

Community Choice Act

Passage of the Community Choice Act (S. 683/H.R. 1670), which promotes independence with dignity and allows individuals who receive long-term services through Medicaid to have a choice in where, how and from whom they receive personal assistance, is the long-awaited next step forward in the fight for the civil rights of people with disabilities. NCPD, a long-time proponent and advocate in behalf of this legislation, is in the process of development with the USCCB, Catholic Charities USA, and the Catholic Health Association, of a letter that will be signed and sent to Congress in support of its passage.

NCPD is also a founding member of the Interfaith Disability Advocacy Coalition (IDAC) which is a part of the Interfaith Initiative of the American Association of People with Disabilities (AAPD), the host organization for IDAC that is convened by Ginny Thornburgh, the Interfaith Initiative's Director. IDAC announced its support for the Community Choice Act on Monday, June 22, 2009, the 10th anniversary of the landmark Olmstead Supreme Court decision, *Olmstead v. L.C.*, which stated that the unnecessary institutionalization of individuals with disabilities constituted discrimination and violated the Americans with Disabilities Act. NCPD was among the 22 signers of IDAC's announcement and of the written sign-on letter that was sent to members of Congress urging them to support the legislation. According to the letter, the coalition feels bias toward institutional placements is in conflict with the shared values of the coalition's faiths, and by allowing older adults and people with disabilities to receive care in their homes and communities, this legislation ensures that they can remain active participants in their families, neighborhoods and religious communities.

Abortion Being Advanced-- We Need to Stop It

Congress is advancing **health care reform** legislation that includes taxpayer funding of abortion. Already Congress has voted to use taxpayers' money to fund **elective abortions** in the District of Columbia, thus, violating our right to choose not to be complicit in the evil of abortion.^[i] Furthermore, it is statistically documented that the unborn with disabilities are at much greater risk of never being allowed to be born. It is critical that any health care reform legislation reflects longstanding policies which reject abortion funding and mandates, and which provide for conscience protections. Furthermore, such legislation should not promote policies that foster the **hastening of**

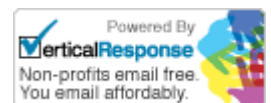
