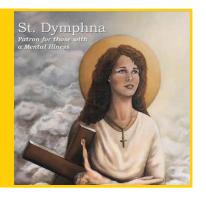


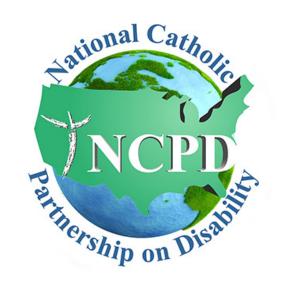

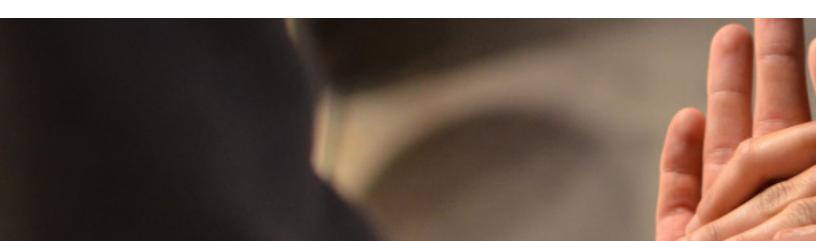

Keynote Presentation - Building Hope Together: Suicide Prevention as a Shared Ministry Responsibility

Catholic faith communities are a natural setting for supporting people with mental and emotional health challenges, including those at risk for suicide. Individuals often turn to ministry leaders who are uniquely positioned to provide the support and resources during difficult times. Additionally, spiritual beliefs and practices tend to help people experience greater hope and meaning in their lives, an identified protective factor in suicide prevention research. Join us as we explore the role of spirituality in suicide prevention and discuss utilizing a comprehensive approach in ministry which emphasizes emotional well-being, connectedness, identifying those who may be at risk for suicide, and helping them to access appropriate care.



Keynote Presenter - Laura Lewis Assistant Director of the Suicide Prevention Program at Ohio State University

Laura is a Supervising Professional Clinical Counselor (LPCC-S) independently licensed by the State of Ohio Counselor, Social Worker, Family & Marriage Therapist Board. She is the full-time Assistant Director of the Suicide Prevention Program at The Ohio State University where she coordinates a campus wide comprehensive program designed to educate and train students, staff, and faculty in suicide prevention education, outreach, and advocacy. In addition, Laura is also the Victim Assistance Coordinator for the Catholic Diocese of Columbus where she works with victims/survivors of clergy sexual misconduct and manages the victim assistance program.

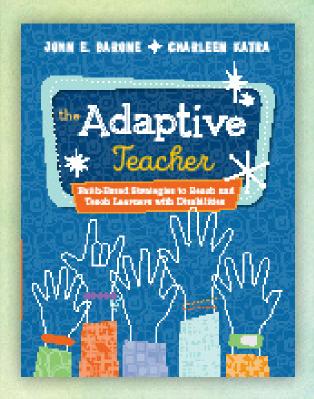

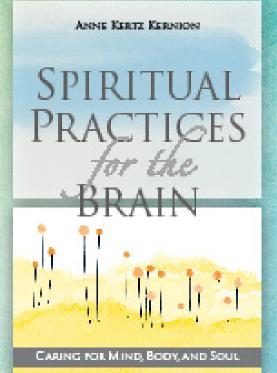

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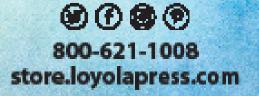

Caregiving - Working with Specific Issues

The Caregiving Ministry is a very powerful ministry many parishioners embark on with very little training. The Church can support these parishioners with guidance and prayer. Helping many of these Caregivers is done with the knowledge they themselves can have health issues brought on by the stress of Caregiving. In the case of Caregivers of families with Dementia, studies show 66% of Caregivers either die or are hospitalized before their loved ones because of stress. The Church can help these families by providing scriptures and counseling to help relieve stress.

Complex Trauma and Addiction

Research has shown that 97% of people who struggle with addiction to a substance or activity have Complex Trauma (C-PTSD). Earlier in life, they did not see the substance or activity as a problem, but as a solution to their problems. It took them out of their pain, or seemed to help with their stress. In order to help people with addiction, we must see the addiction as a symptom of deeper issues (Complex Trauma), and we must help them heal from their trauma and give them healthy tools to deal with pain and stress.

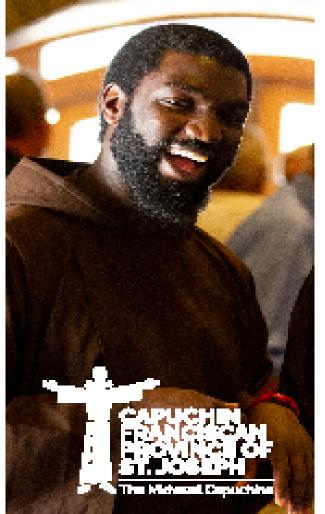
Plenary Session - Sr. Hope: Community Based Mental Health

Keynote Presentation - Understanding Mental Health and Responding More Generatively to it when it is Fragile or **Broken – Towards a Deeper Empathy**

The first part of the presentation will focus on the complexity and fragility of mental health inside all of us. What are our struggles? What defines 'normalcy'? Where are we all fragile? What are the 'existentials' in terms of genetics, biology, environment, and personal wound that impact our mental health? The second part of the presentation will focus on equipping ourselves to be leaders for mental health ministry. It will offer Ten Commandments for the Long Haul, suggesting ten ways in which

we might work at proactively building a culture that responds more empathetically and generatively to those struggling with mental

fragility and mental health.



Keynote Presenter - Fr. Ron Rolheiser, O.M.I. Faculty member and past president of the Oblate School of Theology in San Antonio, TX

Fr. Ron is an author of at least 16 books, and a weekly column carried in many newspapers worldwide. He keeps an active speaking schedule, and his retreats and workshops have inspired many. Keynote Presentation - Following in the Footsteps of Jesus: Affirming Accompaniment in a Mental Health Pandemic

This presentation is about ways to work with individuals that are suffering from mental health issues. The presentation will aim to help ministers understand the importance of early mental health intervention, and challenge ministers to recognize their limits in accompaniment. The presentation will motivate ministers to become equipped to identify mental health red flags and learn about professional services in their respective areas. The presentation will challenge ministers to look inward and reflect on their personal mental health struggles in addition to prioritizing burnout prevention.

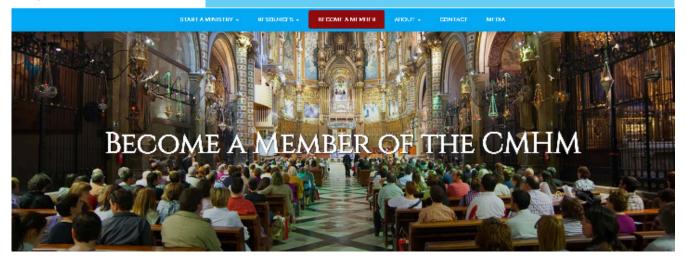
