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Caring Conversations The Resurrection of the Lord

Between the time of his death and resurrection, Jesus' followers experienced feelings of great sadness, doubt, disbelief, fear, and confusion. As a family, consider reading one or more of the following Gospels:

The Resurrection of Jesus Luke 24:1-12; Matthew 28:1-10; Mark 16:1-8; John 20:1-10

The Appearance on the Road to Emmaus Luke 24:13-35; Mark 16:12-13

The Appearance to Mary Magdalene Mark 16:9-11; John 20:11-18

The Appearance to the Disciples
Luke 24:36-49; Matthew 28:16-20;
Mark 16:14-18; John 20:19-23

The Appearance to Thomas

Caring Conversations The Resurrection of the Lord

After completing a reading, discuss how the followers' feelings changed to joy and belief. Additionally, family members may choose to share personal experiences of how they went from confusion to clarity, sadness to joy, doubt to belief, or fear to peace. Loved ones may opt to draw a picture to display the change in their feelings. Remind each other that Jesus wants us to be happy and peaceful. Conclude your conversation by reciting the following verse from Romans 15:13 -

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.





Family Devotions and Prayer The Resurrection of the Lord


Jesus' resurrection is celebrated on Easter Sunday. Catholic Online describes Easter as "the fulfillment of God's promises to mankind" (https://www.catholic.org/lent/easter.php). Throughout the bible, God promises to lighten our troubles if we bring our problems to Him. By bringing your burdens to Jesus, he will bring you comfort and help you endure your hardships. In recognition of this promise, consider creating a prayer box for your family. Family members can decorate the box with an empty tomb and bible verses about God's promise. Cut a hole in the box at the opening of the tomb. Write down your problems and symbolically give your burdens to Jesus by putting them in His empty tomb. Family members can help each other by writing down the concerns of loved ones and dropping them in the box.

Family Ritual and Tradition The Resurrection of the Lord

Many families have traditional food that they prepare for Easter dinner. This year, your family may choose to include "Pane di Pasqua" (Italian Easter Bread) as part of your meal. This bread is very symbolic of the events surrounding Easter:

- its wreath shape reflects Jesus' crown of thorns
- the three braids of bread are in honor of God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit
- the eggs represent our new life brought about by Jesus' resurrection
- the bread is a reminder of Jesus' sharing of the Eucharist at the Last Supper

A short movie, "Grandma's Bread" ("El Pan de la Abuelita"), was produced in 1985 by Franciscan Communications. This 18 minute story is about the relationship between a young boy, Mario, and his grandmother, Nonna. The story connects the symbolism of the Easter Bread to Catholic teachings and the Eucharist. The Resurrection of the Lord

It is written in all four Gospels that Jesus appeared to the disciples after the resurrection:

Matthew 28:18-20

Then Jesus approached and said to them, "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age."

Mark 16:15

He said to them, "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature."

Luke 24:46-47

And he said to them, "Thus it is written that the Messiah would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem."

John 20:21

Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

This Easter, your family may choose to serve as disciples by spreading the good news of Jesus' resurrection. One way to share this message is by filling plastic Easter eggs with verses from the bible. These "Good News" eggs can be given to people you know or placed outside for others to find. Following are some verses that you may choose to include in your eggs

YELLOW – Represents God's Perfect Light

RED – Represents the blood Jesus shed for us

WHITE - Represents the cleansing of our sins

GREEN – Represents the new life we have in Jesus

BLUE – Represents the baptism that identifies us with Jesus

PURPLE - Represents the crown of life



Further Reflection

Alleluia! Jesus is Alive

Jesus died on the Cross on Friday. Mary his Mother and some of his other friends were with him. After Jesus died, his friends placed his body is a tomb on the side of a hill on Friday afternoon. They rolled a large rock to cover the entrance to the tomb.

The Bible tells us that early Sunday morning when the sun was just coming up, Jesus' friends Mary Magdalene and Mary, the mother of James, went to the tomb where Jesus was buried. They brought spices and oils to anoint Jesus' body.

As they walked, they were concerned about how they would be able to roll the stone away from the entrance to the tomb. When they reached the place on the hillside where the tomb was, they saw that the stone had already been rolled away. Looking inside the tomb, they were startled by two angels dressed in robes shining like bright white snow.


"Why are you looking for Jesus?" an angel asked them. "He is not here. Do not be afraid. God has given him new life. Go quickly and tell Peter, Andrew, James, John and Jesus' other friends."

When Peter and the other heard what Mary Magdalene told them, they couldn't believe it was true. So they ran back to the tomb where the body of Jesus had been buried.

John ran much faster than Peter so he waited until Peter caught up with him. What Mary Magdalene said was true! Peter went home, amazed at what he saw!
