MOST REV. BISHOP BRENDAN J. CAHILL, S.T.D.

BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE OF VICTORIA IN TX

Christ's Love Impels Us (2 Cor. 5:14)

Sixty years ago St. John XXIII in communion with the Catholic Bishops from around the world delivered a 'Message to Humanity' before the start of the Second Vatican Council. This message served as an inspiration and motivation for the work of the Council. Bishop Cahill will trace the background of this address and its influence on the opening days of the Council. This serves as a guide to understand more deeply the teaching at the end of the Council in Gaudium et spes 27: 'the Council lays stress on respect for the human person.' This teaching still can inspire and motivate our work!

Brendan Cahill received a bachelor's degree in psychology and a master of divinity from the University of St. Thomas in Houston in 1985 and 1990, respectively.

Following ordination, he served as parochial vicar of St. Frances Cabrini Parish in Houston (1990-1992) and Christ the Good Shepherd in Spring, Texas (1992-1998). He earned a master's degree in Black Catholic Studies from Xavier University, New Orleans, in 1993, and a doctor of sacred theology from the Gregorian University, Rome, in 1998. Since 2010, he served as director of the Secretariat for Clergy Formation and Chaplaincy Services of the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston. He was ordained Third Bishop of Victoria in Texas, in June 29, 2015.

## Creating a Safe and Trusting Learning Environment

Deepening your understanding of neuroscience; the integration of the Central and Peripheral Nervous Systems, 8 Sensory Systems, and the Limbic System, teachers begin to better understand their own behavioral needs and the needs of their students. Applying information shared in the session's hands-on presentation is supportive of creating a safe and trusting learning environment. A learning environment anchored in science provides the safety needed to allow trust. Learning becomes more fluid in all domains; social, emotional, and academics when a child feels safe.





Roundtables provide an opportunity to discuss with peers various focused topics in disability ministry. This is an opportunity to network with others in the field, learn new strategies and information, and gain insights from different perspectives. Better Together: How a Mindset of Inclusion
Benefits the Whole Church



Inclusion of persons with disabilities is part of what it means to be "One Church," but effective disability ministry requires a paradigm shift for clergy, lay ministry leaders, and parishioners. Together, with a catechetical author and clinical psychologist, we will reflect on what it takes to have an inclusive mindset, what this looks like in practice, and why disability ministry benefits the whole Church – not only persons with disabilities. We'll also talk about how to navigate potential challenges and pitfalls, including fear of the unknown.

Dr. Joseph White earned his doctorate in clinical psychology from Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, VA. At the Medical College of Virginia, he completed a program in the assessment and treatment of childhood neurodevelopmental disabilities. His pre-doctoral internship in clinical child psychology was completed at the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center, and his post-doctoral fellowship at Scott and White Clinic.

Dr. White is a member of the American Psychological Association and the Society of Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology. He is recognized by the National Register of Health Service Providers in Psychology and is board certified in sexual abuse by the American Academy of Experts in Traumatic Stress.

Dr. White's primary areas of focus include adjustment difficulties, coping with anxiety, phobias and traumatic experiences, sensory-behavioral issues, chronic pain, and concerns about cognitive, social, or emotional development.



## SENSORY-FRIENDLY MASS

n recent years the Catholic Church has begun offering sensory-friendly Masses for persons who have trouble processing certain stimuli. Such liturgies are designed to be more accessible and inclusive, and they typically feature dimmed lighting, reduced noise levels, and fidget objects to improve a person's

ability to focus. In addition, the liturgy may be shortened, and the homily simplified so that it can be more easily understood. These small changes in sensory-friendly Masses make the liturgy more accessible for everyone and provide an important opportunity for persons with disabilities to participate.



Sensory-friendly Masses typically offer reduced lighting, sounds, and scents.




#### SENSORY FRIENDLY MASSES



The large font size makes it easy to read, and the pages are organized into storage binders so that they can be assembled into an altar appropriate red binder for each liturgical season. The Missal comes in two sizes, 23 and 34, so priests can choose the one that best fits their needs. A CD version is also available with a 44 font size. Also a large-print lectionary in the three fonts sizes is available on CD.



A Pastoral Response to Mental Illness includes a Mental Health Literacy Guide that provides vital information on how to identify and address mental health issues. It covers topics such as when to seek urgent care, the four legs of recovery, and treatments and support services. This guide also contains information on suicide prevention and advocacy. This bi-lingual comprehensive resource is an invaluable tool for clergy, pastoral leaders, and other mental health professionals.

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
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
